
Stormin' Norman Canoe Race

She repaired the outrigger spray skirt a number of times and designed and sewed a special cover for the boat when it was stored at Cadboro Bay.

She was an active member of VCKC. She volunteered in the kitchen during Wake Up The Gorge. She helped with our annual Timmy's Paddle/Paddle for the Kids providing a hot dinner for the paddlers. She enjoyed volunteering on Canada Day helping excited kids put on PFDs so they could go for a paddle on the gorge waterway.

She always had a nice happy smile. She listened to you. She always had something positive to say. She was a joy to have around. Sharon will be missed by many club members, but especially by The Boat People.

Canoe Update

Running Of The Cow, May 4th and 5th - The camping side of this annual event will proceed although, on the date of this publication, it would appear the river will not have enough water in it to be paddled. The water flow is being reduced to 7 cubic meters per second, a level which can be maintained throughout the summer in attempts to avoid the fish kill experienced last summer. A normal flow in April would be around 25 cm/s. This unprecedented but necessary water conservancy has taken us by surprise. It is likely Marie Canyon will now be paddled, by experienced paddlers only, during ROTC on one or both days. If you have registered for this event we will keep you informed of water conditions and the campout closer to the dates.

Marie Canyon is the middle section of the Cowichan River and due to its rocky (cheese grater) shores its characteristics remain consistent year after year. The canyon is short and the flow is confined to narrow channels allowing it to be paddled even during low water. Even so, it requires skill and during high water it is for advanced paddlers only. The right channel of the 'Last Drop' has an obstruction and is undercut as well and can be dangerous at any level.

An introduction to Marie Canyon will be offered as an Eddy Hopper clinic to experienced novice paddlers who have been certified on the Moving Water Tandem course. Clinics on tamer water may also be available on the spur of the moment depending on water conditions so register for the Eddie Hoppers by contacting the canoe director. One of these clinics has already taken place, advancing the skills of the participants.

The lakewater and ocean canoeing courses will continue to take place.

Outrigger Update

2024 WUTG event

Our VCKC WUTG started in 1999, making this the 25th year since its inception. We did miss a couple of years due to COVID. This event is only possible because of our many volunteers, so thanks to everyone. Let keep it going for another 25 years. We also wish to thank LAT48 for loading us their OC6s.

We had a total of 22 crews from 9 paddling club registered for the OC6 sprints on Saturday. But only 5 crews registering from VCKC we're hoping next year to have a few more VCKC crews participating. The best combined 2 x 1000m sprint time was from LAT48, 9 minute 44 sec. The best time from a VCKC crew was 10 min 36 sec. Overall, the perfect day as everything ran smoothly.

Sunday's small boat was down with only 15 participators, but still everyone enjoyed themselves. The current under Tillicum Bridge was running too fast and it would have been unsafe (a bottle neck) if more than one canoe entered at the same time, so it was decided to start the race south of the Bridge. The 2 racers on their SUP couldn't safely get under the bridge and had to carry their SUP and walk over to other side of Tillicum Bridge. The fastest time was competed by Melanie Conrad from LAT48 (56'24"), with our own Jason Doucet finishing 10 seconds behind. Overall members from VCKC had a good showing.

Should our outrigger program try and develop and create the best racing crews possible to represent VCKC? Is there an interest in doing this? See you at our outrigger meeting on April 22.

April 7, morning: Small boat races. 9.54 Km

Often, I create my own challenges. This time I flipped my K1 as I put it on the water. The start was South of Tillicum Bridge, and I had the other challenge to paddle underneath the bridge and face the rough waves before reaching the start line. It was a miracle that I didn't fall in.

Our marathoners did well, and my participation to the race created the K1 age category: 80+.

April 7, afternoon: Tandem C2 race. 6.94 Km

Jason, Chum, Darrelle and I were the only canoeists willing to race. I partnered with Darrelle, and Chum with Jason. There was no competition as Chum and Jason were so much faster than Darrelle and I. There was a strong wind and ultimately Darrelle and I raced 'against' ourselves and the wind. Thank you, Darrelle and Jason.

Clubhouse and Grounds Update


